8 TO: TRIP OUT: Tactical Regulation for Information Protection & Online User Transparency
9

10 SECTION I:

11 Cybersecurity attacks, including data breaches, hacking, and fraud, pose serious risks to
12 individuals, businesses, and governments worldwide. As more people depend on digital
13 platforms for communication, commerce, and governance, these attacks threaten personal
14 privacy and global stability. Moreover, there is a growing need for transparency in how online
15 services collect, use, and protect personal data. This resolution aims to establish a global
16 framework to defend against cyber threats while ensuring users are informed and protected

17 SECTION II:

18 To address cybersecurity and data transparency, several key measures will be introduced. First,
19 an automated threat detection system will monitor online activity and flag potential breaches.
20 The International Cybersecurity Coalition (ICC) will coordinate the response to these threats
21 and assist local authorities. Additionally, all online platforms will be required to implement clear
22 privacy policies and earn a Digital Transparency Certificate (DTC) to show their commitment to
23 data protection. Educational campaigns will raise awareness about online security, encouraging
24 users to adopt practices like multi-factor authentication. When attacks occur, rapid-response
25 teams will investigate and prosecute offenders, with penalties such as fines, bans, and
26 imprisonment.

27 SECTION III:

28 The initiative will be funded by participating countries, contributing 0.01% of their GDP to the
29 Global Cybersecurity Defense Fund (GCDF). Additional funding will come from fines imposed on
30 offenders and voluntary donations from tech companies. This fund will support the
31 administration of the program, cybersecurity advancements, and educational efforts.

32 SECTION IV:

33 This is an opt-in initiative, but those who choose to participate will enforce penalties on
34 offenders. These will include fines based on the severity of the cybercrime, jail time for repeat
35 offenders, and digital restrictions that prevent convicted individuals from using online services.
36 Offenders will also be added to an international "Digital Offenders" registry, which could lead to
37 travel restrictions or further legal consequences.
