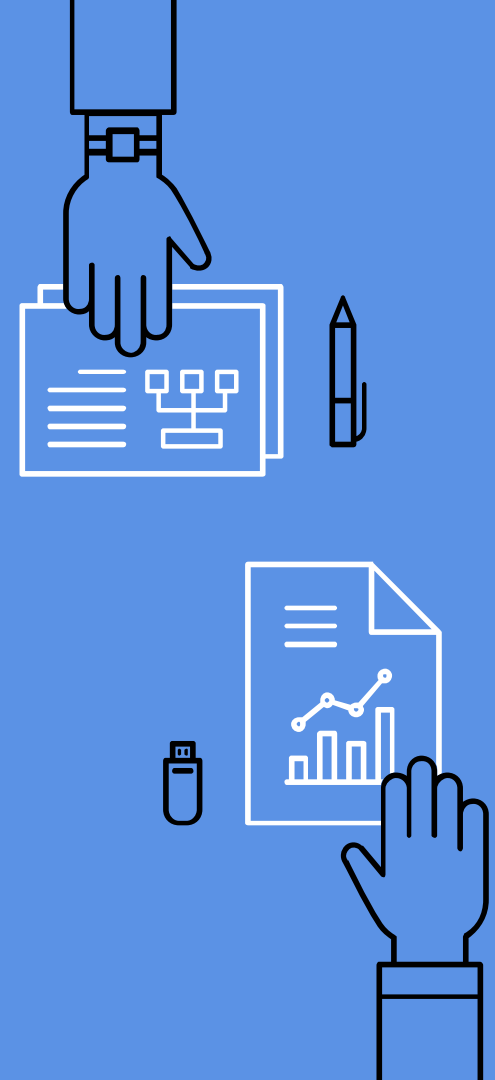
Council Breakdown - General Assembly

The General Assembly is the main deliberative, policymaking and representative organ of the United Nations in which members of the United Nations have a unique forum for multilateral discussions of a broad range of international issues.



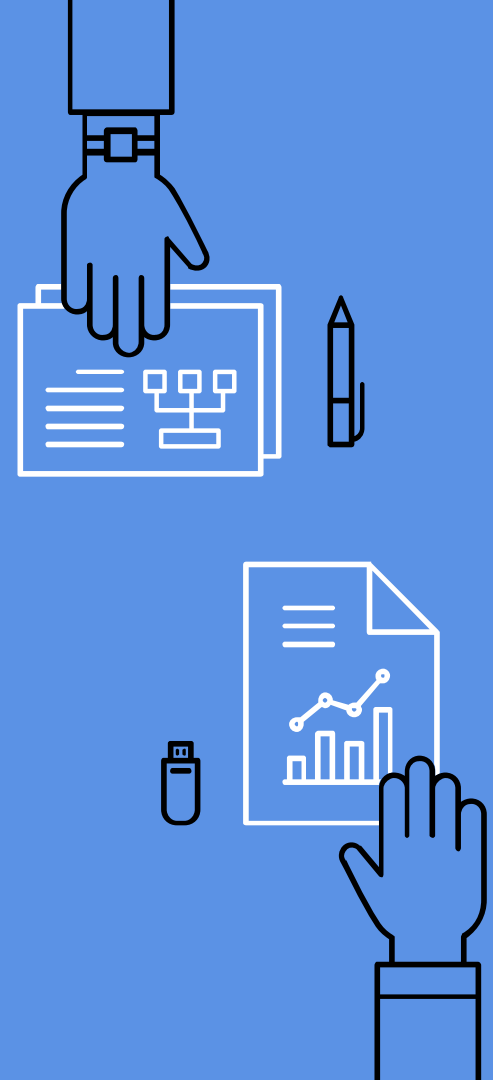
Council Breakdown - Economic & Social Council

The Economic and Social Council (EcoSoc for short) is the central forum for discussing international economic and social issues and formulating policy recommendations addressed to member states and the United Nations system.



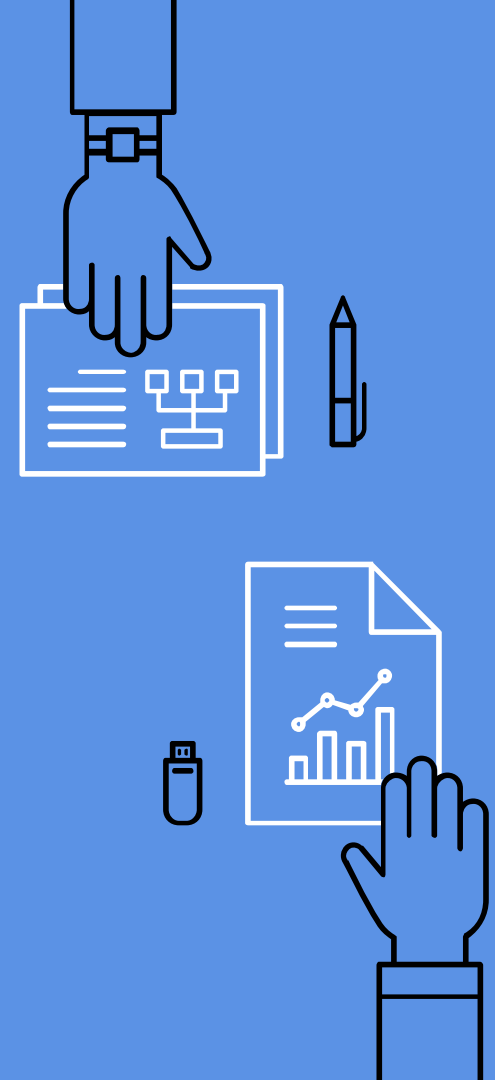
Council Breakdown - Security Council

- Smallest council of the United Nations
- Covers topics of international security in relation to criminal activities, country relations, property security, and more
- The Big Five (Russia, the UK, the US, China, and France) have veto power
 - Veto power: if a single member of The Big Five votes "nay" on a resolution, the resolution may only pass by a $\frac{2}{3}$ vote of the entire council



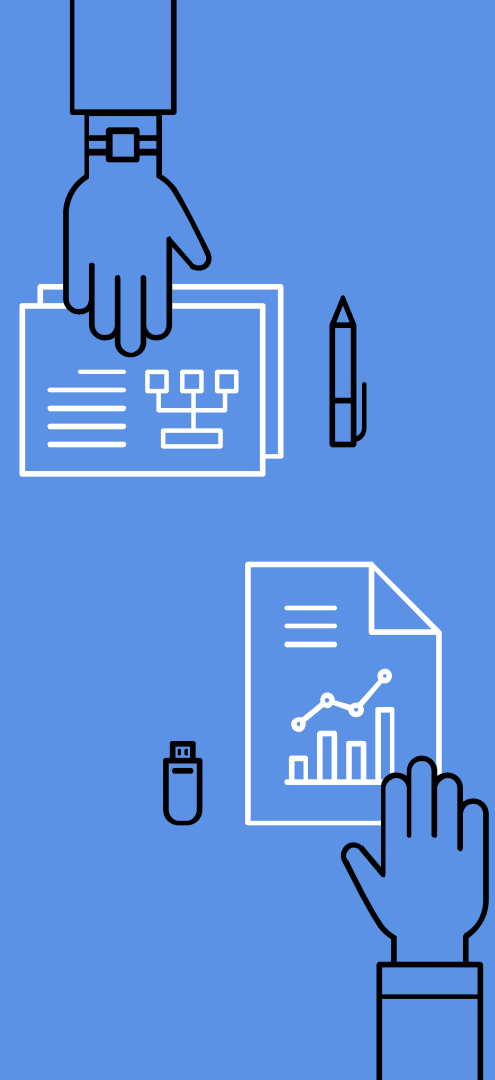
Plenary

- Final debate of the weekend
- At this time, MUN 2021 will decide whether any of the resolutions written are worth of being signed into the UN Rule of Law
- The Secretary General, with input from the Presiding officers, will determine the Plenary Docket and display for the conference to see
 - These resolutions are the top from each council - those that are successful and highly ranked



Conference Changes

- **Position Statements** and **Resolutions** must be submitted before conference on February 5th. There are no Country Data Sheets. Submissions through website.
- **At least 1 Resolution** must be submitted per country per council. If a Resolution is not submitted for one of the 3 Council Topics, you may submit a Resolution for the Special Topic in your Council.
- Chain Yielding not allowed. No amendments allowed besides **Technical Amendments** - fixing number or grammatical errors.
- **No Points of Information**



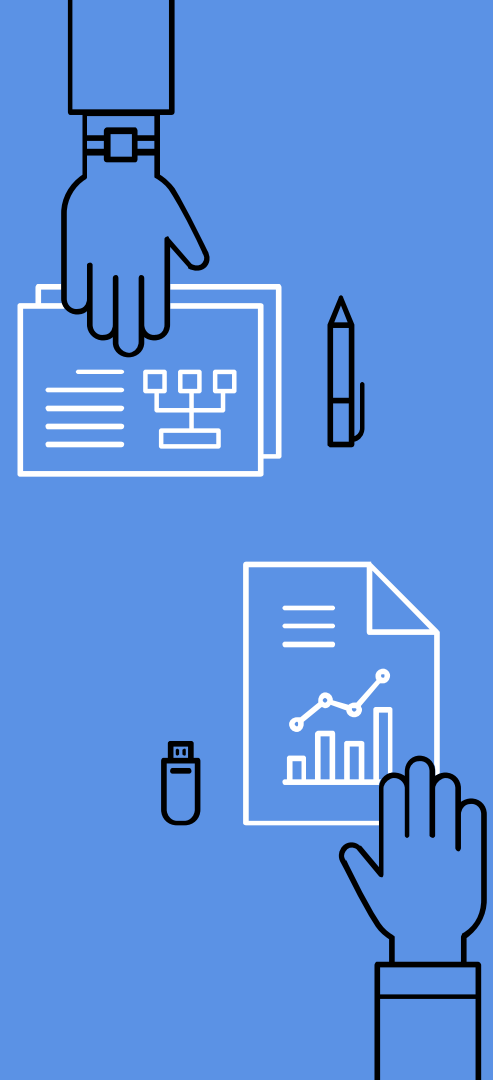

INTENT TO RUN FORMS:

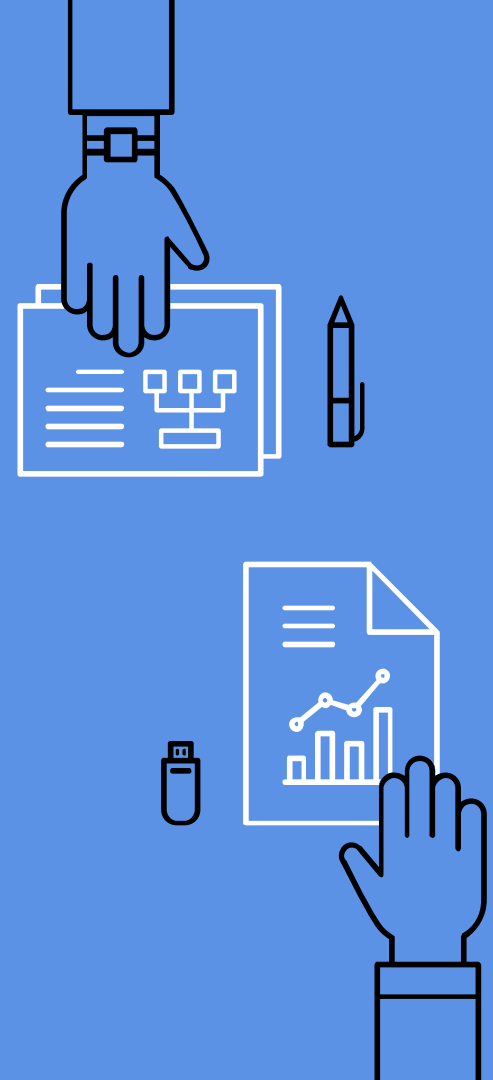
- GA has 6 PO's on State Board.

Cultural Showcase

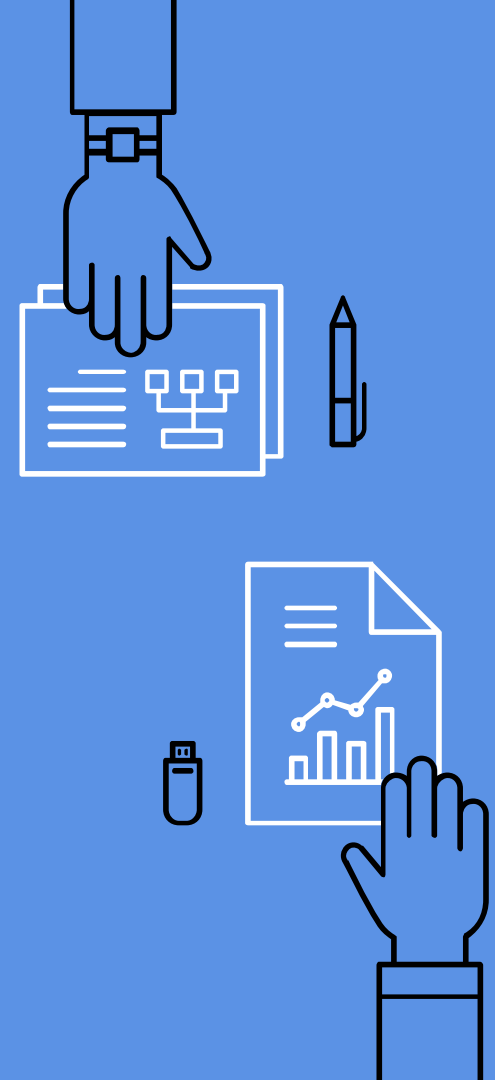
Cultural Showcase:

- Healthcare in Poverty-Stricken Countries
 - How efficient are the healthcare programs already established in your country? How has poverty affected healthcare within your own country?



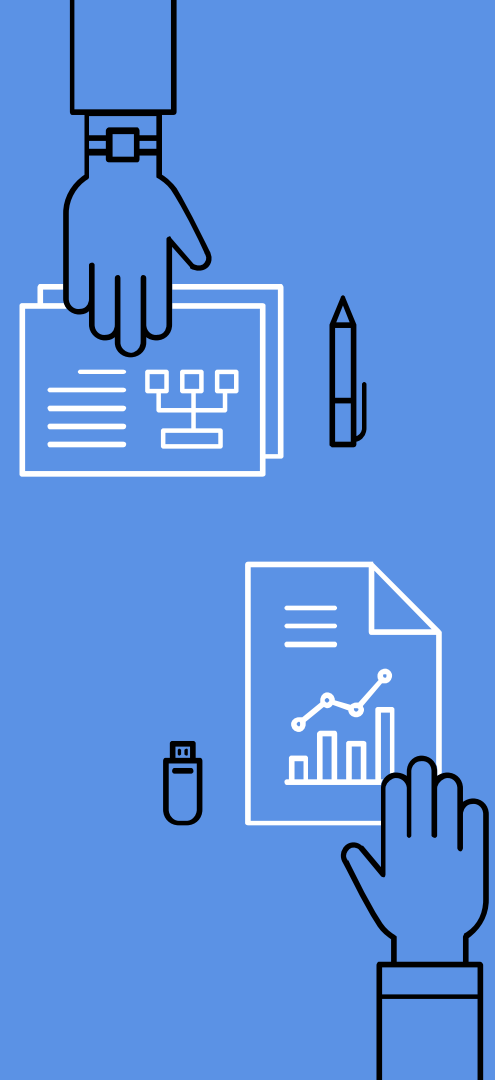
Topics- Economic and Social

 - Does your country have secure water access? Does your country help developing countries achieve secure water access?



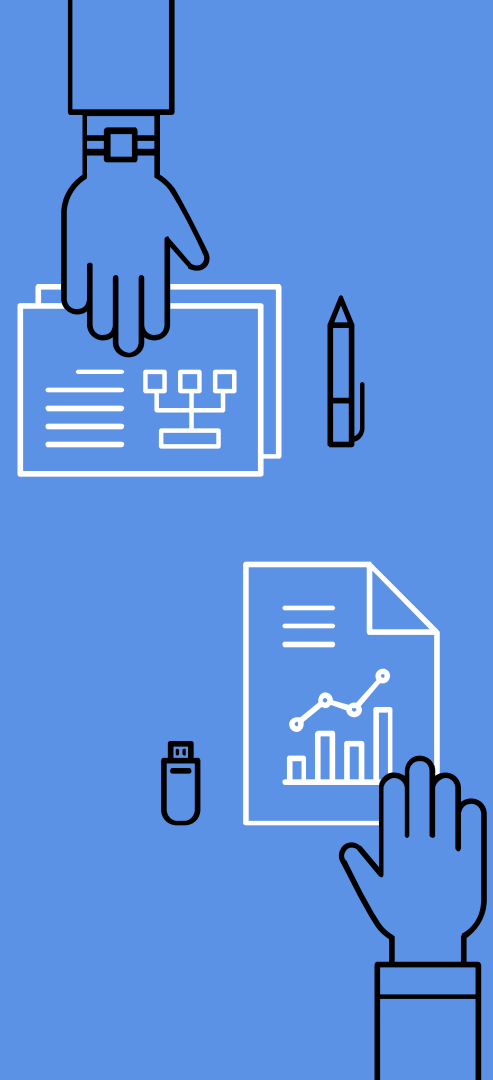
Topics- Security

- Transnational Organized Crime and the Drug Trade
- Analyzing how the drug trade fuels multi-national crime organizations and what the UN can do to stop and mitigate its negative effects.
- The Grand Ethiopian Renaissance Dam Conflict
- Mediating the debate between Ethiopia and Egypt with a focus on encouraging cooperation in Africa and across the world while advancing into the 21st century
- Corporate Imperialism
- Taking a stand against a new strain of abuses against the human person, not by countries, but by corporations that typically prey on the vulnerable of the third world.

TO: Carbon Recycling Technology

SECTION I:
As climate change continues to harm the Earth in ways such as desertification and rising sea levels, a solution to slow effects of excess carbon in the atmosphere is necessary.

SECTION II:
Get funding from the tax that the United Nations puts upon countries that exceed allowed carbon emission levels to develop geoengineering technology that converts excess atmospheric carbon dioxide into liquid carbon dioxide to be stored. This liquid carbon dioxide will be recycled into fuel and gasoline to reduce mining of fossil fuels, which releases excess carbon into atmosphere, to restore the natural carbon cycle.

SECTION III:
The United Nations will enforce a carbon tax upon countries that produce carbon emissions that exceed regulations. This money will be used to develop the technology needed to perform this atmospheric carbon harvesting.

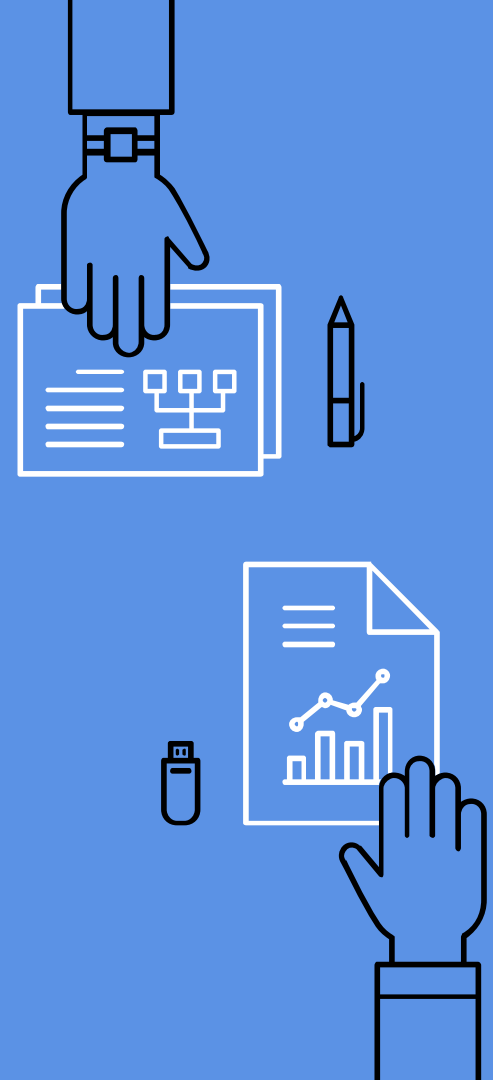
SECTION IV:
