9 TO: Preserving Humanity's Well Being

10  
11 **SECTION I:**

12 To maintain peace with the unexpected visitors. Guatemala wishes to refrain from  
13 provoking any unnecessary harm towards our world citizens. The effects of going to war  
14 with forces we are completely unfamiliar with, warrants too high of a risk to our earth and  
15 human race.

16 **SECTION II:**

17 We believe the best step to upkeep peace with these extraterrestrial beings is to refrain  
18 from initiating any threats or actions until a sign of aggression from the beings is shown.  
19 This includes any intent or initiative of attacks or destruction on humans. Doing this will

22 **SECTION III:**

27 charged as a category 4 war crime.

## 7 A RESOLUTION

8

9 TO: Diplomacy Thrives on Strength

### 10 SECTION I:

11 Emphasizing that this moment in history presents a once-in-a-lifetime chance for nations  
12 to interact with extraterrestrial beings and form the first human connection with another  
13 species.  
14

15 Recognizing that both math and violence are universal languages.

16 Understanding that the aliens could pose an existential threat to the Earth.

17 Also understanding that the aliens could propel our understanding of technology into the  
18 future.

19 Emphasizing that peace should always come before violence.

20 Peace: attempting to communicate with the aliens?

21 Violence: having an army lined up as a backup in case things go wrong while making  
22 contact. This army should be concealed from the aliens to maintain a peaceful front.

### 23 SECTION II:

24 1) Decides to create a council of scientists, mathematicians, historians, and communication  
25 specialists provided by the UN Security Council. Funding and support for these scientists  
26 would be provided by the United Nations. The scientist's main goal would be to contact the  
27 aliens using modern human languages and mathematics. The goal is to prove that the aliens  
28 can receive and send communications with humans and that they are peaceful.

29 2) Further resolves to assemble a military force in case communications fail. A military  
30 presence will be established in neighboring areas such as islands around Antarctica.

31 3) Encourages all nations that are currently overshadowed by a UFO to organize a military  
32 presence to monitor and guard the vessel. Should a nation lack the ability to form a military  
33 presence, they are encouraged to contact their allies for the necessary troops and  
34 supplies.

### 35 SECTION III:

36 Countries could use the provided funds to outfit their scientists with equipment.

37 Additionally, countries will need to outfit their own military.

### 38 SECTION IV:

39 Countries who choose to opt-out of this program will not be penalized, but interference  
40 with the research conducted will result in sanctions of a proportional degree. Such  
41 proportions will be decided by the UN Security Council.

## 7 A RESOLUTION

9 TO: Improvise. Adapt. Overcome

### 10 SECTION I:

11 Since we don't know what the intentions of our new visitors are, we must figure out if they  
12 come peacefully or not before undertaking any significant action which could lead to  
13 negative outcomes. If we immediately choose peace and try to negotiate, we risk appearing  
14 weak and may lose the advantage of surprise and the element of the unknown, so they may  
15 be more inclined to attack humanity. If we immediately choose war and try to attack them,  
16 we risk not knowing if they will survive, and this will only serve to agitate them, leading to  
17 potentially disastrous repercussions, or we may even risk losing out on a whole new world  
18 of knowledge and new perspectives, which might help us anywhere from reversing climate  
19 change to finding the perfect burrito recipe. Therefore, the best immediate course of action  
20 is to figure out what their plan is so that we can more strategically improvise, adapt to the  
21 new circumstances, and overcome this unknown obstacle in front of us. In essence, Ireland  
22 suggests sending powerful leaders of historic nations to discern their true intentions. We  
23 will include mathematicians as well since the language of math is universal (even with  
24 different base systems, we can convert using the methods we already have like binary,  
25 decimal, and hexadecimal). After figuring out their true intentions, we can appropriately  
26 respond in the best interests of humanity: whether that be nuking all of Antarctica (like  
27 setting a house on fire to get rid of a spider) or inviting these new people to assimilate  
28 into our society and bring another culture to the global stage.

### 31 SECTION II:

32 As the world is experiencing a global crisis, the actions carried out by this bill must have a  
33 mandatory binding to some extent. In effect, Ireland proposes that the United Kingdom, in  
34 particular, should bear the responsibility of sending its leaders, diplomats, and  
35 mathematicians (of which at least the current Prime Minister, Queen Elizabeth II, and 10  
36 Cambridge and Oxford professors, each in a different field of mathematics, should be part  
37 of the sent group) as the first to understand and possibly negotiate with the  
38 extraterrestrials. This is due in part to the fact that the UK holds some of the world's most  
39 renowned figures in both politics and mathematics, and also due in part to a sense of  
40 obligation that the UK owes to the rest of the world, which it had at one point in history  
41 colonized a quarter of, with many of those former colonies now consisting of major  
42 presences within the United Nations. Ireland strongly encourages other previous colonizing  
43 powers to send a proportional amount of representatives, but this is only mandatory for

1 the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Northern Ireland, as it had the furthest reach as a  
2 colonizing power and still enjoys the most benefits today as a result (English across the  
3 world, strong trading partners, etc.). As a failsafe, those sent to the aliens will be disguised  
4 as "lost wanderers" of sorts in an attempt to disconnect them from the rest of humanity  
5 and thus not necessarily portray them as the world's representatives in the event that the  
6 mission goes awry.

### 8 SECTION III:

9 No funding is necessary for this resolution.

10

### 11 SECTION IV:

12 There are no penalties for the countries for which this resolution is optional. The penalty  
13 for the United Kingdom not participating is an immediate economic sanction (to encourage  
14 them to participate and to reflect cutting off the means of wealth which they originally  
15 acquired through their largely undesirable and often inhumane colonization) if they have  
16 not sent the aforementioned leaders and mathematicians by the 28th of February, 2021  
17 (12 a.m. midnight Greenwich Mean Time).

## 6 7 A RESOLUTION 8

9 TO: Implement the Hunger Games Program

### 10 11 SECTION I:

12 A war with a secret society possessing advanced, cutting-edge weapons would be  
13 catastrophic. One thing each country would have to consider is how to distribute resources  
14 among the people. There are, of course, countless different ways to do this, but most  
15 would involve bias and wouldn't be fair.

16 This resolution provides a solution to this problem that is completely opt-in: The Hunger  
17 Games, altered to be more humane. The state/province/region of a country's victor would  
18 be given  $\frac{1}{4}$  of all of that country's available resources.

19 Victors from each country would be permitted to enter the International Hunger Games, in  
20 which the victor would secure all of the surplus money not used to fund the Hunger Games  
21 Project for their country.

### 22 SECTION II:

23 Once again, this would be a completely opt-in program. All countries willing to participate  
24 would build an arena designed by the Gamemaker in their country's capital city. Tributes  
25 from each state/province/region/etc. would volunteer to have their names drawn during the  
26 reaping, which would occur on a day agreed upon by  $\frac{2}{3}$  of participating countries. Two  
27 tributes would be chosen from each state/province/region.

28 Stylists and mentors would be hired for the tributes. If at any point during the game a  
29 tribute were to back out, they would be allowed to leave, but they would not be permitted  
30 to return.

31 To eliminate any unfair advantages a tribute might have, the International Games would be  
32 held on a platform floating on the ocean and not in any one country. The same rules from  
33 the individual countries' games would apply.

### 34 35 SECTION III:

36 All countries willing to participate would contribute 0.05% or more of their yearly GDP to  
37 the Hunger Games Program. This money would be used to build arenas and supply the  
38 salaries of the Gamemaker, stylists, mentors, etc.

### 39 SECTION IV:

40 No penalties are required for this resolution, since participation is not mandatory.

11 **SECTION I:**

9 TO: The World's Great Trial

10  
11 **SECTION I:**

12 Armenia is no stranger to civil unrest and unhappiness. These strong emotions cause  
13 societies and parties to form; however, these parties can sometimes be good and bring  
14 needed social change or can be evil and threaten the institution that protects us. One such  
15 recent example of an area that is a breeding ground for this type of unrest and chaos is

17 **SECTION II:**
